
Application Procedures

- Create an FSA ID for both student and parent on studentaid.gov
- Use the IRS Data Retrieval Tool if eligible
- Add The University of Alabama
 - School code 001051
- Review your Student Aid Report (SAR) after completion
- Renew your FAFSA every year using prior-prior year tax information

General Eligibility Requirements

- Be enrolled and taking classes in a degree-seeking program.
- Be enrolled at least half-time
 - 6 credit hours for undergraduate students
 - 4.5 credit hours for graduate students
- Be a U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen
- Have a valid Social Security number
- Maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) requirements as defined in The University of Alabama undergraduate catalog

Federal Student Aid



Grants

- Awarded to eligible undergraduate students pursuing their first bachelor's degree
- Federal Pell Grant eligibility is based on Expected Family Contribution (EFC) and enrollment status
 - Maximum amount for the 2023-2024 year is \$7,395
- Federal Supplemental Education Opportunity Grant (FSEOG)
 - Based on EFC of 0
 - Maximum \$1500 per year
 - Very limited funding

Federal Work Study & Student Employment

- Funding is limited
- Federal I-9 verification process and the Federal Work Study Job Fair
 - A variety of job opportunities are located both on- and off-campus
- Funds are paid directly to the student bi-monthly
 - No funding will be credited to the student's bill
 - Rate of pay varies dependent upon position
- Part-time job opportunities are accessible to all students in the local community on our part-time job board, jld.ua.edu

Federal Direct Loans

- Subsidized
 - Does not accrue interest while enrolled
- Unsubsidized
 - Accrues interest while enrolled
- Annual loan limits (combined subsidized and unsubsidized)
 - \$5,500 1st year undergraduates (0-30 hours)
 - \$6,500 2nd year undergraduates (31-60 hours)
 - \$7,500 3rd year undergraduates and up (61+ hours)



Preparing for Fall



Federal PLUS Loans

- Borrowers are either parents of dependent undergraduate students OR Graduate Students
- Annual loan limit = cost of attendance minus aid
- Interest rates are set every year in July
- Loan fees are based on principal amount of each loan
- Repayment begins 60 days after the loan is fully disbursed; deferment option upon request
- Based on credit as determined by the Department of Education
- Application available at studentaid.gov

Additional Unsubsidized Loan Eligibility

- Additional unsubsidized loan eligibility for dependent students whose parents are unable to borrow under the PLUS Program:
 - \$4,000 per year for undergraduates with 60 or less credit hours
 - \$5,000 per year for undergraduates with 61 or more credit hours

Repayment of Federal Loans

- Repayment begins either
 - Six months after graduation or
 - Six months after dropping below half-time enrollment
- Loan repayment can be set up in 10-, 20-, 30-, 40-, or 50-year plans
 - Repayment is set up with your loan servicer
- Use the Repayment Estimator on studentaid.gov to estimate monthly payments, learn about deferment, and cancellation provisions



Student Account Services



How are Students Billed?

- All billing occurs through the student financial account at *myBama.ua.edu*. Paper bills are not mailed.
- Students and Authorized Users are notified when bills are available via email.
- The student's email address for University official business is the @crimson.ua.edu.
- Students can opt in for text messages and add an alternate email address.

Why Do I Need an Authorized User Account?

Authorized User accounts must be set up by the student and are <u>REQUIRED</u> for our office to discuss the student's financial information.

• Users will receive communications from Student Account Services and can view the student's financial account, make payments, and enroll in payment plans.

Billing Process

- Action Card privileges <u>will not</u> work until payment has been made in full or enrollment in a payment plan for the term has been completed. Privileges include student health center visits, rec center access, athletic/sport event access, and dining dollars.
- Class schedules will be cancelled as a result of a student not paying their account balance in full or enrolling in a payment plan by the due date.

When are Financial Aid/Scholarships/3rd Party Payments Applied to the Account?

- When students are awarded aid they must accept the award and fulfill any other requirements, such as signing a promissory note.
- Once Financial Aid, UA Scholarships, and/or other outside resources are authorized, they will show as projected credits to reduce the student's account balance.
- Non-UA scholarships will be applied to the student's account when payment is received.

Payment Deadlines

- Fall Bill will be available on July 17th and the payment due date is August 10th at noon.
- Spring Bill will be available on November 15th and the payment due date is December 11th at noon.
- Summer Bill will be available on April 15th and the payment due date is May 10th at noon.
 - Payment in full or payment plan participation is required no later than noon on the due dates above to prevent schedule cancellation.

Payment Plan Information

- First payment is due at enrollment.
- Payment Plan fee is \$30 and due at time of enrollment.
- Payment plan installment dates are fixed dates. If a payment plan due date falls on a weekend or holiday, plan enrollment and payment deadlines will be extended to the next University business day.

Fall Payment Plans

4-Payment Plan: 25% due at enrollment and 3 remaining payments of 25% each

• Opens: July 17th

• Closes: July 31st

• Installments due August 10th, September 11th, and October 10th

3-Payment Plan: 34% due at enrollment and 2 remaining payments of 33% each

• Opens: August 1st

Closes: September 21st

(Enrollment from September 11th-September 21st will require a 67% payment)

Installments due September 11th and October 10th

Once payment plans are closed, payment in full is required.

Spring Payment Plans

4-Payment Plan: 25% due at enrollment and 3 remaining payments of 25% each

- Opens: November 15th
- Closes: November 30th
- Installments due December 11th, January 10th, and February 12th

3-Payment Plan: 34% due at enrollment and 2 remaining payments of 33% each

- Opens: December 1st
- Closes: January 21st
 (Enrollment from January 10th- January 21st will require a 67% payment)
- Installments due January 10th and February 12th

Once payment plans are closed, payment in full is required.

How Can Payments be Made?

- Electronic checks can be made online at no cost.
- Credit/Debit Card payments are accepted online through the students financial account (includes a non-refundable convenience fee of 2.95%, \$3 minimum).
- Paper checks and certified funds can be mailed or dropped off to the SAS office for processing. Make sure to include student name and CWID.
- Wire payments can be processed through TransferMate, a third-party vendor. TransferMate does charge a fee for domestic wires.
- International educational payments can be made online through the following:
 - FlyWire Payment can be made at https://payment.flywire.com/pay/payment
 - TransferMate Payment option available when you login to student bill through myBama

How Do I Get a Refund?

- All student refunds are processed via Direct Deposit with one exception:
 - A credit balance may be refunded back to a credit card used to pay on the account.
- Students should setup a refund account through the "Pay Your Student Bill" link on myBama. Only students have access to setup the refund account.

Tuition Insurance

- Tuition Insurance is available through GradGuard in partnership with Allianz Global Assistance for students.
- Participation is optional and the agreement is between you and GradGuard.
- You must purchase insurance prior to the first day of class. Coverage extends through the end of that semester.

Frequently Asked Questions

- What is the access granted course material charge and why is my student being billed for it so late in the semester?
 - Access granted course materials can be an access code for homework or online reading material. These are not charged to the student account until after the add/drop deadline for the semester. Students can opt out of the access granted course material through their Blackboard page.
- My student is not an engineering major. Why are there engineering fees on their account?
 - College and course fees are charged based on the student's schedule, not their major.



Ride Share Programs

- •Request rides through an official app. **NEVER** accept a ride from a driver you have not requested.
- •Schedule your ride inside. Use the official ride-share app and wait inside until the app indicates your requested driver has arrived.
- •Plan the safest locations for pickup and drop off. Watch for traffic and make sure you don't get out in a dangerous location.
- •Verify the ride. Make sure you get into the right car. Verify the license plate and make sure the driver info matches what is listed on the app. NEVER get in a car you have not requested and cannot verify just because they say they work for a ride-sharing company.
- •Ride in the back AND buckle up. If you're riding alone, the backseat allows you to exit on the safest side. Seatbelt safety is always important.
- •Share your ride details with someone you trust. Most ride-sharing services offer ETA or status-sharing opportunities.

Ride Share Programs

- •If that's not available, snap a photo and send it to a personal contact to let them know your plans.
- •DON'T share your personal details with the driver. Protect your private information and don't share too many personal details when chatting.
- •Track yourself. Follow the route on your phone's map to make sure you don't go off-route.
- •Rate the driver. Share any concerns about your driver or experience so the companies can take action if needed.
- •Be careful about consuming alcohol. Alcohol can impair judgment and impede your ability to follow other safety tips.
- •Follow your instincts. If a situation feels uncomfortable, pay attention. Call 911 if you feel unsafe or in an emergency.

Text - To - 911

The University of Alabama Police Communications Division which is located within the Tuscaloosa County Emergency Operations Center is now capable of Text to 911. All agencies in the Tuscaloosa County Emergency Operations Center will have the ability to not only accept inbound messaging (allowing the public to directly access 9-1-1 through text messaging from their wireless handset) but may also conduct outbound messaging (sending text messages to the public).

Text-to-911 will be especially useful for the hearing or speech impaired and extremely useful in those situations where it is not safe to place a voice call to 9-1-1. Tuscaloosa County 9-1-1 and the University of Alabama Police Department encourages citizens with police, fire or medical emergencies to call 9-1-1 if they can and text 9-1-1 only if they cannot.



 Capstone Center for Student Success






Future Housing Options

 Off-Campus Resources provides guidance in transitioning to off-campus housing.






Future Housing Options

- There are plenty of off-campus options. Take time to do your research.
- In Alabama, a student's signature is **legally binding** if they're 18 or older, whether or not their guarantor/cosigner qualifies.
- Two types of leases joint (by the unit) and individual (by the bedroom.)
- Length of a lease is typically 11-11.5 months.
- Total rent amount is divided into 12 equal monthly payments beginning in August before move-in.


When a Problem Arises, Move Like Your Feet are Stuck in Molasses




ACADEMIC ADVISING

- Advisors are the faculty or staff members who will assist students in selecting classes for their degree program.
- Students should get to know their advisor and seek their advice.
- Encourage your student to visit their advisor regularly.
- Students seeking to change majors should see their advisor.
- College visit experiences (and advising structures) vary by college.
 - Listen for:
 - Who will be your student's advisor?
 - Will that person change over the course of their time at UA?
 - When should your student schedule their next advising appointment?
 - Where can you find your student's curriculum?



FACULTY

- Students should get to know at least one professor each semester. This will help when it comes to needing letters of reference. Encourage the FYE Out to Lunch Program.
- Professors will communicate with your students directly.
- Mid-term grades are distributed to students in 100 and 200 level courses so inquire with your student around mid-term to ask how they are doing.
- Office hours is a time dedicated to talking to students.
